Readings Exodus 20:1-17; Psalm 19: 7-10; 1 Corinthians 1:18, 22-25; John 2:13-25

Accepting God in our Lives

As I looked for what would bring our readings together this week the word acceptance comes to mind. Can we accept God's presence in our lives by living his commandments, not as something that limits us, but as means to share His life. Can we accept the Cross of Christ and not allow it to be a stumbling block to our faith. Can we recognize and accept the newness of life to which Jesus is calling us to. In all of the readings to recognize the signs and the respond in faith.

The Ten Commandments or Decalogue are not merely ten rules, they are an invitation to have a share in God's life. They are not just to be lived in a superficial way. They should be written on our hearts that we can live them in their fullness. The beauty of the Law reveals God's very nature, He is the only God, therefore we give Him the central place in our lives and do not take Him for granted. By keeping holy the Sabbath we give God space in our lives, that allows a personal intimate encounter with God. These commands are grounded in the person as opposed to an impersonal legislative system. It is said that God spoke directly to the individual Israelites.

The psalmist speaks of the Law as perfect, sure and wise. "the command of the Lord is clear, enlightening the eyes." To be more desired than gold and sweeter than honey. It is not restrictive, but rather builds us up, pointing at success and guiding us.

For St. Paul the cross is the good news – the Gospel. At the same time it is a stumbling block to both Jews and Gentiles. In other words, to everybody he talks to. Jews want signs and Creeks ask for wisdom, but if you can accept the mystery of Christ, then it becomes the power of God and the wisdom of God. It's not like any other human wisdom. It leads to salvation which makes Paul say, "God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength. Initially Paul would have had trouble speaking about the cross because his hearers would not have understood – how can weakness, suffering and death be a good thing? But it's not about who we are, It's about who God is. His reality stands our values upside down. It's not about accepting human wisdom, but God's love for us.

It's Passover and Jesus is in the temple. There would have been serious crowds from all over the world in Jerusalem for the feast. They would have needed sacrifices and Jewish coins for the temple tax and other offerings. The people selling cattle, sheep and doves and the money changers at their tables were taking over the outer court, the court of the Gentiles. Jesus makes a whip of cords and drives them out of the temple. "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a market place."

The authorities confront Jesus. They ask for a sign justifying this action. Jesus tells them..."

Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." The temple was a magnificent structure. In 20BC Herod the Great rebuilt and significantly enlarged it, taking 46 years. But, of course, Jesus wasn't talking about a building, he was speaking of his body. Jesus has come to bring newness. The temple would be destroyed in 70AD by the Romans and never rebuilt. Jesus' body is the new temple, the function of the old temple is replaced by Jesus and his church.

His actions are prophetic, reminiscent of Jeremiah (ch.7) and are themselves signs. Signs seen in the proper context are the way people come to believe. It is interesting then while some Jews were asking for signs others saw them.

How did you come to believe? Did you accept everything all at once or did it take time to develop a sense of faith. Coming to appreciate what we are being shown in Christ. For the disciples many things only became clear in the light of the Resurrection. As they made sense of it they could better appreciate what Jesus did and said. Jesus body became a place of divine revelation – the house of God.
